
DR. TINYIKO CHAUKE [PHD] POSTDOCTORAL FELLOW



SUMMARY

Dr Tinyiko Chauke approaches research using a Social justice and the Decolonial paradigm that aims to challenge us to disrupt the conventional scientific analysis on our communities. Instead, the focus is on the construction of stories and its contribution to the participants' social construction of identity while disrupting the "grand" narrative. She holds a PhD in Psychology from the University of South Africa and was previously a Doctoral Research Trainee at the

HSRC's HIV/AIDS, STIs and TB (HAST) research programme. Her research interests include; histories of feminist and gender studies in the African diaspora, precolonial African sexualities, the history of same sex relationships in Africa, decolonial research methodologies, African and decolonial feminism and elderly women's sexualities. In addition to exploring qualitatively HIV risk factors associated with individuals labelled as key population in most research studies, my work at the HSRC introduced me to understanding this fact through such projects as: involvement in implementing HIV bio-behavioural surveillance for key populations, such as men who have sex with men (MSM), transgender women and female sex workers. Between the years 2016 to 2018 I was part of a team managing the first southern African HIV bio-behavioral survey for transgender women that was focused on exploring high-impact prevention interventions for transgender women in South Africa as well as two other national surveys namely; the national survey of the health of

South Africa's Educators and the fifth South African National HIV Prevalance, Incidence, Behaviour and Communication Survey. My doctoral work draws from a decolonial

African feminist framework and uses it as a tool to question, deconstruct and reimagine African sexual cultures, it further explores questions of citizenship and belonging in a democratic state such as South Africa. Finally, my PhD training has taught me how to tackle a problem that a few have faced before and to independently seek out the appropriate resources and/ or mentors and craft a novel and effective solution.
