After multiple engagements with internal and external stakeholder-communities within existing food and food systems projects, it became clear that there was potential to evolve a productive and collaborative transdisciplinary programme across knowledge-fields and functional areas within and beyond the University. So, the Mandela University Food Systems programme was initiated in early 2021.

This initiative is central to the University's vision of being in service of society, and to work in tangible, equalizing ways to make real-life contributions in tackling key socio-economic challenges.

The programme has been hard at work to understand, clarify, and map the various existing food systems projects and programmes active in the University, and to explore the potential of connecting – or the convergence of – these projects and programmes to be responsive

TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Terms of Reference were co-constructed by the Working Group as a guide for the Mandela University Food Systems programme. The development of the Terms of Reference was framed around who potential stakeholder-communities could be, what this could potentially entail or look like, as well as potential areas of focus and impact. Furthermore, it was framed around the importance of the programme, possible linkages across the Terms of Reference, and what actionable steps could be made moving forward.


Currently, the purpose of the programme has been set out as follows:

- To coordinate and create a level of priority for our collective approaches and interventions related to 'food' as a key component of Nelson Mandela University's engagement strategy.
- To clarify, explore and nurture a demonstrable and transdisciplinary programme across knowledge-fields and functional areas of the University.
- To collaborate with multiple stakeholder-communities, both internal and external, that are food systems-oriented.
- To develop strategic partnerships provincially, nationally, continentally and globally, and to reach out to diverse stakeholders for input, buy-in and programme implementation.
- To hold meetings of the various stakeholder-communities in order to engage in dialogues, discuss progress made, and collaborate on new ideas moving forward.

SECRETARIAT

In this section the secretariat share around the background of the programme, and how it aligns with the Engagement and Transformation Portfolio's vision, as well as the University's Vision 2030.

The secretariat's role is to coordinate and facilitate the work of the Mandela University Food Systems programme, and have utilised the critical participatory action learning and action research method to establish a firm foundation for the programme - one that is inclusive of all social structures within the institution and its stakeholder-communities. Based on this method, it is important to note that the work of the programme will continuously reshape and manifest itself through the process of learning and co-learning with its stakeholder-communities. Currently, the Mandela University Food Systems programme has been active within the University, however, plans are to further engage with external stakeholder-communities aligned with the following:

ALIGNMENT WITH ETP's VISION

- 1. As evinced in Term of Reference 4, the Mandela University Food Systems aims to be 'locally responsive, nationally active, regionally alive, and globally aware'. It is also focused on creating 'socio-economic impact...in the interest of the public good' which is one of the ETP's key performance areas.
- 2. Intending to become a signature project of the University, the programme aligns with the ETP's aim of leading 'creative and innovative engagement and transformation projects'.
- 3. One of the proposed research outputs for the project is the publication of academic articles, and fits with the portfolio's aim of 'cultivating a culture of scholarship'.
- 4. It is important to note the upscaling and coordination for food intervention is a key priority that has been recognized and acknowledged through the different sets of structures within the University beyond the ETP, such as the Senate and Council. The programme will aim to advance and assist linkages amongst the sciences to further develop better interdisciplinary solidarity. In other words, to encourage the ability to embrace the different schools of thought and paradigms we adhere to when we work around questions and responses concerning food.

ALIGNMENT WITH VISION 2030

- 1. Food production, distribution, availability, and its politics is a significant discourse to social inequalities. It thus came as no surprise that food re/emerged as a major thematic through Covid-19; central to people's daily struggle for dignified and sustainable livelihoods.
- 2. The University's emerging strategic plans focus on serving society to contribute positively to the formation of a sustainable socio-economic and epistemically just world.
- 3. In striving to address the issue of food, the programme is deeply aligned with the University's Vision 2030 to be in service of society and to create a sustainable, socially just world.
- 4. The pandemic has forced us to adopt a sustainable, long-term approach in questioning food systems and thus aims to connect existing projects and initiatives to create a collaborative space in which meaningful, productive work can be achieved.
- 5. We aim to upscale this within the University through its various divisions, sectors, and across the different sets of networks within the Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality (NMBM). Furthermore, linking networks within the Eastern Cape Province will also be a priority.
